# Alamo Squadron Model Building Summit Award

#### Purpose:

To recognize those Alamo Squadron members who actively support the Alamo Squadron to improve their own and other club members' modeling skills and display the club's work to the public.

Criteria for Award: Alamo Squadron members must complete activities worth a minimum of 5 points during the course of the year (Apr - Mar). Members must complete and display, either at contests or club meetings, a minimum of three (3) models during the year (Apr- Mar). Points are earned by club members for each of the activities below:

- A. Build and display a completed model.(1.5 points)
- B. Demonstrate a modeling technique or method to club members (1 point).
- C. Submit an article to the club newsletter about a model build, kit review, modeling technique, or about scale modeling in general. (1 point)
- D. Serve as Model Fiesta Director, Newsletter Editor, Multimedia Coordinator, Education Coordinator, Model Summit Chairman, or any other position appointed to by the president. (1.5 point)
- E. Work as a volunteer at Model Fiesta, a Region 6 contest, or at Nationals. (.5 point) F. Work as a judge at Model Fiesta, or a Region 6 or National level contest. (.5 point) G. Serve a term as club president, vice president, or treasurer. (1.5 point)

#### **Procedures:**

1. Members can accumulate points toward Model Summit Award for as many activities as they wish as long as the minimum requirement of building, completing, and displaying at least three (3) models during the year is met. All activities must be entered in the logbook by the end of the March meeting.

Members are solely responsible for updating their page in the Model Summit logbook as each model or activity is completed.

- 2. The Model Summit Chairman will ensure the logbook is present at each meeting so members can update their sheet.
- 3. Following the March meeting, the Model Summit chairman will review member activities for the year and identify those club members who have met the Model Summit Award criteria.
- 4. The Model Summit chairman will work with the Alamo Squadron Executive Board to provide appropriate awards/materials/kits for the Model Summit drawing during the April meeting. All present eligible modelers will select their award during the April Meeting starting with the modeler with the most completed models. All other present eligible modelers will select their award in random order. If a modeler is not present at the April meeting, they will be contacted by the Model Summit Chairman to arrange pickup.



Art, History, and Engineering Combine to Make Scale Modeling a Unique Hobby



Have you ever been asked why you build scale models? How did you answer the question? Have you ever given thought to what it is about this hobby that captivates you, that consumes your time, and lightens your wallet?

My answer to this question is that scale modeling uniquely combines art, history, and engineering.

Some pursuits combine two of these elements, but none fully accomplish model building's trifecta. Although vehicle/aircraft restoration has similarities, no other hobby integrates these three elements in quite the same way.






Scale models are threedimensional works of art. In the hobby's most extreme forms, the construction of figures and scratch building, it fully incorporates sculpture. Figure painting is seen by many as a form of art. But all scale model builds involve some form of artistic composition. The selection and execution of paint and marking schemes, a part of every project, is certainly artistic expression. The design and arrangement of

stowage, bases, and dioramas is pure artistic composition. Anyone who has finished a scale model has completed a work of art.

Virtually every model project is inspired by history. I include literature and media in my definition of historical sources as they are part of cultural history. By this definition, aircraft, figures, sci-fi subjects, etc. all have some historical basis even if they have not ever physically existed. This element of the

hobby invites modelers to research their projects to properly understand and depict them. Consequently, modelers frequently have extensive of libraries of photos, books, and videos of their preferred subject matter. Historical research underpins scale modeling. The folks from Chattanooga (2019 Nationals) made this point by asking if "the war was over after the Germans bombed Pearl Harbor".



Engineering is about solving problems and it expresses itself in the hobby in two ways. The subject modeled always has a technological aspect. Whether it is a rare version of a particular tank or a sci-fi figure with a futuristic garment, every model describes a form of technological innovation. By undertaking the project, the modeler is appreciating the science and technology represented in the subject modeled. The hobby's second engineering aspect is finding solutions to the model's building and finishing challenges. Scale modeling is full of tools, tricks, and MacGyverisms. Almost every seasoned modeler possesses an assortment of jigs and custom-made gadgets created to conquer particular problems. A key theme in the hobby is trial and error. Finishing a model is an engineering feat, a triumph over the

project's opposition.

I invite you to test my theory that scale modeling is a blend of art, history, and engineering. The next time you are with a group of modelers, listen to the dialog and the questions asked. How did you do that? Why did you paint it in that scheme? That painting effect is amazing! Where did you find the references? What was that version designed to do? Wow, what a beautiful build!

Art, history, and engineering combine to give scale modeling a unique and broad appeal. Each modeler can relish the three elements in his own personal way. When you consider your attraction to model building, which of these three aspects do you enjoy the most?



### Alamo Squ<mark>ad</mark>ron Treks to the H.A.<mark>M.</mark>S. Show by Rob Boo<mark>th</mark>

I tagged up with fellow Alamo Squadron member Stan Spooner in Boerne about 7:00AM on July 9 th to make the drive over to Spring, Texas for the annual Houston Automotive Modelers Society's annual model car show and contest. We discussed plastic the whole way over, and after the 4-hour

drive quickly passed, we pulled up in front of the Cypress Creek Christian Church to unload our entries.

Following a quick and easy check in with Robert McQuown, Mike Stucker & Dr., Co., Stan and I distributed our stuff on the contest tables. I took a 1/24 Ford GT "click kit" and 1/25 Jim Hall Chaparral 2Dr Coupe to enter. The Ford GT is finished in a matte black paint scheme with two bright orange GT stripes down the center of the body. It also has orange brake caliper housings and orange accents in the interior. The Chaparral is the classic white paint scheme with various sponsor markings. I corrected a few things on it that are left over from the kits' former life as a slot car body. Stan brought several of his military vehicles to enter in the appropriate categories that were offered.

We ran into Keith Rule and his wife in the contest room, and of course Jerry Escobedo was there vending his wares. The four of us made up the attending Alamo Squadron contingent. I met Stan's buddy, and now my new friend Russell Wells and his wife Micki


at the show. Russell is an amazing car builder, and I learned many tips from him as we all ate lunch together at a nearby Tex-Mex place. When we returned, I offered to assist with any judging that still remained to be completed, but chief judge David Green indicated they were nearly done.

I hit the vendor area and scored a couple of interesting older kits, an AMT "Amtronic" two-part futuristic transport. It's a special edition of the original kit dated 1969. Also bought a Monogram kit of the Oldsmobile Aerotech released in 1989. It looks like a Formula I body with an IMSA shell on it. AJ Foyt set some speed records out at Ft. Stockton with it back when I was much younger.

Once judging was completed, the awards ceremony commenced. I garnered a third place in one split of the Open Wheel Competition category for the Chaparral, and

a second place for the Ford GT in the Box Stock category. Keith Rule received a second place for his Auburn Speedster in Foreign & Exotic, a first place for the Bekins Moving Tractor

/Trailer in



Commercial Vehicles, and a first place for



his VW Combi Camper Bus in Factory/Showroom. Stan was awarded a first place for his Magiras ARW and a second place for his Ba-64b in Military Wheeled and Semi-Tracked Vehicles as well as a 3 rd place for his Warhammer LRDG in the Miscellaneous class. Our friend Russel Wells took the top two placings in the 1/43 scale class, and the "Best Interior" award for his Porsche Racer.

Following the awards, we packed up our goods in the car and headed home at about 5:00PM. After some snafus navigating construction on the 99 toll road, we headed West as the miles passed with more talk about plastic, judging, life, etc. A good trip with good people. That's what this hobby is all about.

Thanks to Rick McQuown, Mike Stucker, David Green and all the guys at HAMS for another great show.





I painted the model in mid-war German Luftwaffe day fighter camo and useful Japanese markings, so I called it the **Ki-109Q**.













Hey Herb, is it for sale?


